#### President's Column

Well, after the remarks I made last month, real winter came to see us, and with a vengeance! The winter as a whole may have been pretty mild this year, but the week in the middle of February hit Texas and surrounding states very hard. The worst part, of course, was the terrible performance of our ERCOT (Electric Reliability Council of Texas) electricity grid. Aftershocks from the abysmal mismanagement will be felt for quite a while. As I write this letter, 5 of 15 ERCOT Board Members have resigned, and two Texas Congressional investigations are going on. LinkedIn has been abuzz with various organizations chiming in, and many people pointing fingers. Some of the less informed are actually blaming a lack of renewables as the cause. (In case you are unaware, wind generators froze up and were unable to produce, while clouds and ice/ snow shut down solar panels.) EROCT irresponsibly sent power to buildings in downtowns that were closed (the event occurred on a weekend, with a minor national holiday the next day, so many of these offices would not be open the next day, anyway). The people who had electricity shut off for an extended period due to mechanical issues continued to be without power as part of a "rolling blackout" for more than 48 hours, while others that had electricity shut off for "15-45" minutes" did not get their power back on until the temperatures came back up, 33 or more hours later.

Because of these power problems, we had to postpone the February luncheon for ten days, and convert it to an on-line only event (with a few people meeting together at Midland Energy Library, near the PBS-SEPM Office). Thank you to Dr. Shane Prochnow for working with us to get the February event rescheduled, and to those who were able to join us.

We should now be back on track for an interesting and diverse series of presentations for the spring. Casey Mitchell will be our March speaker, and will take us on a whirlwind tour of going from college student to independent operator. April will see Dr. Jane Zobe of Colorado School of Mines fill us in on the latest research his students and colleagues are doing on outcrops of the Bone Spring Formation! May wraps up our spring series with Dr. Carol A. Hill (author of our #1 selling book, Publication #96-39, Geology of the Delaware Basin...) talking about her latest publication, which sums up 22 years of research in the Grand Canyon. Carol will be signing both books at our luncheon, which will make for a wonderful luncheon and also a memorable Annual Meeting. Additionally, one of her Grand Canyon co-authors may be available to autograph the book, as well, so be sure to sign up early for the Annual Meeting!

In addition to our regular events, Dr. Rebecca Dodge will fill us in on her "Texas is Art" Exhibit, which will be at the Sibley Nature Center for a three-month tour. This beautiful series (the Board was privileged with a sneak peak at the exhibit) showcases satellite imagery of the state. Calendars of the exhibit will be for sale, as well. Proceeds go toward fellowships for students studying remote sensing, (find the article below to get more information).

"From College Student to Starting an Oil Company: A Journey from Nothing to Success in the Modern Oil Field?"

#### Abstract / Biography

After spending years trying to figure out what direction my career path would take, a desire to solve complex problems and puzzles led me to west Texas. Bringing the drive of a construction powerhouse, and venturing from Texas Tech to the far mountains of Big Bend's Sul Ross. I built a following by attending conferences. building up the Geology Club, and publishing research. All in the hope to attract employers. All was well, interest was garnered by several majors and supermajors! Everything was great.....then 2014 happened. All hope of getting my feet on the ground running came to a screeching halt.



Trudging forward, and bouncing around from a micro independent with serious financial problems while completing a thesis, and retuning to west Texas to work wellsite geology, things were fairly stagnant and a little boring. I reluctantly decided to form an entity, with zero plan for it. Fast forward six months, I was signing the transfer paperwork on my first "producing" (it did at one point) oil lease. Having almost zero funding, a little ingenuity and elbow grease, brought about the beginning of a strange and unexpected journey. Learning the production side of the industry, and some engineering, coupled with sabotage, interesting characters, epic failure, and moderate success has been a true experience one can only have in the world of small oil.

The hope to expand had always been at the forefront of my mind. Always searching the orphan well list, the oil well classifieds (they exist), and digging through deeds and old lease records for the next project. Bring the covid disaster, and worst drop in oil prices in all of history, the day before having my second load of oil hauled. Companies everywhere are bleeding cash left and right, and letting go of leases like hot potatoes that were immersed in magma. A pair of leases for an awfully low price popped on the radar, begin round two! Pulling records, well logs, asking questions, searching for funding, etc. brought about the unimaginable, and the potential success unthought of even a month before. Due to the nature of this acquisition, most of the information about my new Permian



Basin assets cannot be released just yet. I will say one thing though, ALWAYS run a GR-N-CCL before perforating you wells, you cannot afford to miss all of your stacked pay zones.

> So far this has been quite a ride, I hope my story can inspire those that have been brought down by the current events, or perhaps cheer you up with some of the craziness that comes with starting your own oil company with almost zero money.

#### Texas as Art 2021

PBS-SEPM would like to showcase Rebecca L. Dodge and her talents to create beautiful art pieces of West Texas landscapes paired with insights regarding the wildlife management, Texas State Parks, and Permian geology. This is known as her "Texas as Art 2021" art show. The "Texas as Art 2021" show displays satellite imagery depicting West Texas landscapes that focus on themes of the natural eco-regions and the organization that helps manage, conserve, and restore these natural areas, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Rebecca Dodge hopes these images will engage people and inspire them to understand the importance of managing our resources, exploring the land we live on, and learning more about the remediation efforts.

She had proposed this idea to <u>USGS</u> in June of 2020, and was granted the funds by TexasView and it's parent organization <u>AmericaView</u> in July 2020 and began downloading the satellite images in September 2020. Her technique consisted of perusing the large Landsat images and selecting sections within those large maps that would highlight the natural eco-region diversity and human presence. Once satisfied with the selected sections, she began playing with visible and infrared light spectrums to enhance the textures of each image. The changes in intensity, hue, and saturation within Adobe Photoshop allowed her to create 14 remarkable art pieces that we West Texans can not only appreciate with our eyes, but also our hearts, as we call this place our home.

All her information about eco-regions is sourced from the <u>Texas Wildlife and Parks</u> <u>Department</u>, which has pages of information for each State Park. This information paired with the selected Landsat images, makes learning more accessible and fun for not only scientists, but also the people who live here too. Rebecca Dodge has also created education materials for the elementary, middle, and high school students to make learning about the eco-regions around them more approachable. These materials include a scavenger hunt of matching eco regions / land forms with a set of clues, identifying depositional environments, and mapping dendritic drainage patterns.


She plans to take the art pieces throughout Texas stopping at each of the 13 institutions within the TexasView Remote Sensing Consortium. Virtual tours for groups of any size can be scheduled via email at rebecca.dodge@msutexas.edu. It is free for all and can be a wonderful way to learn more about the landscape and eco-region we call home.

The Fa Gallergy on Andrews Highway is providing prints of these art pieces and calendars with a different piece marking each month. Please reach out to Jeff Neely at the Fa Fa Gallery if you would like to purchase either of these items. All profits received from the calendar sales will be donated to the TexasView organization into their Texas Art Fund. This fund will provide sponsorship to students who attend any of the 13 TexasView partner institutions (including UTPB and Texas Tech) and who need grants for their geospatial / geoscience application projects.

Rebecca L. Dodge plans to further develop this project by adding satellite imagery of the rest Texas' landscapes. She also hopes to start on another project to highlight the historic oilfields of the Permian Basin in collaboration with the Petroleum Museum.

# Zane Jobe Research Professor at Colorado School of Mines Chevron Center of Research Excellence (CoRE)

"Progradational Slope Architecture and Carbonate-Siliclastic Sediment Partitioning in the Outcropping Bone Spring Formation: Implications for Reservoir Heterogeneity in the Delaware Basin"

#### **Abstract**

Sediment transport and partitioning are important for understanding slope-building processes in mixed carbonate-siliciclastic sediment routing systems. The Bone Spring Formation, Delaware Basin, west Texas is a mixed carbonate-siliciclastic system that has been extensively studied in its basinal extent, but poorly constrained at its proximal, upper slope segment. In this study, we constrain the stratigraphic architecture of the proximal Bone Spring outcrops in Guadalupe Mountains National Park in order to delineate the dynamics of carbonate and siliciclastic sediment delivery to the basin. These upper-slope deposits are composed predominantly of fine-grained carbonate slope facies interbedded at various scales with terrigenous hemipelagic and sediment gravity flow deposits. We identify ten slope-building clinothems that vary from siliciclastic-rich to carbonate-rich; each clinothem is truncated by slope detachment surfaces that record large-scale mass-wasting of the shelf margin. X-ray fluorescence data indicates that slope detachment surfaces contain a higher-than-normal proportion of terrigenous siliciclastic sediment, suggesting failure is triggered by accommodation or sediment supply changes at the shelf margin. Furthermore, a wellexposed siliciclastic-rich clinothem, identified here as the 1st Bone Spring Sand, provides evidence that carbonate and terrigenous sediment were deposited contemporaneously, suggesting both autogenic and allogenic processes influenced the Bone Spring Fm. stratigraphy. This mixing of lithologies at multiple scales and the prevalence of mass-wasting act as a primary control on the stacking patterns of siliciclastic and carbonate lithologies on not only the Bone Spring margin, but also in the distal portion of the Delaware Basin.

#### **Biography**

Zane Jobe is a research professor at Colorado School of Mines and the Director of the Chevron Center of Research Excellence (CoRE) - http://core.mines.edu/. Prior to Mines, Zane spent 6 years in the Clastics Research Team at Shell Oil Company. His research interests aim to better understand the stratigraphic architecture, scaling relationships, and sediment budgets for clastic depositional systems, with an emphasis on submarine environments. Zane also manages the "Earth Resource Data Science" program at Mines (https://online.mines.edu/er/), which focuses on applied data science and machine-learning using python and subsurface datasets. Zane also enjoys cycling and hunting and thinks that copious amounts of yard work can be cathartic. Zane received a B.S. in Geology from the University of Texas at Arlington in 2004, and a Ph.D. in Geology from Stanford University in 2010 (advisor - Don Lowe).

PBS-SEPM is the Permian Basin Section of SEPM—the Society for Sedimentary Geology. However, you do not need to be a SEPM member or a geologist to join PBS-SEPM.

#### Scholarship and Distinguished Speaker Events (2020-2021)

Wendell J. Stewart Fund: so named for the famous sequence stratigrapher, was initially funded by the family, and then later through PBS-SEPM members who have contributed over the years. In the past, the scholarship was established to award high school students intending to pursue a college education in the geoscience field (declared major), and had evolved to include college students actively pursuing a geology degree when there were no other qualified candidates. Funding for this scholarship has waxed and waned over the years with the changes of the petroleum industry and because this scholarship is set up in such a manner that only the interest can be used to distribute funds, most scholarships in the last 30 years have been awarded through the PBS-SEPM main budget and not the scholarship fund.

We are proud to announce that we had two receivers for the Wendell J. Stewart Scholarship Fund in May 2020: Vanessa Armendariz, an undergraduate petroleum geologist at UTPB, and Heather Dudley, a paleontology graduate student at Sul Ross.

**Robert Read Distinguished Lecturer Fund**: was founded to honor a bright, young geologist who had been an active member of both PBS-SEPM and WTGS and was tragically killed by a drunk driver. Donations from various members of both societies contributed to a membership donation fund that both encourages our continuing education efforts by helping offset the cost of bringing in a distinguished lecturer, usually in geosciences, but not required.
